## **Highlights:**

- General anti-poaching patrol and biological monitoring was conducted round the park and observations were reported, (two people were accosted).
- Troops of Mona monkey, Green snake, birds, crabs, Cobra, Beetles, butterfly, skink, Dragonfly and Monitor lizards were sighted in the park.

• **Tidiness & Cleanliness**: Tidiness of the Board walk and other park facilities is ongoing, sweeping of board was done. Also trail inspection was also carried out during the week; some handrails were damaged by the thunder storm experience during the heavy downpour of rain within the week. Though, replaced immediately.

**Coastal erosion & Encroachment**: monitoring of coastal erosion is ongoing, as observation shows that siltation and deposition of debris along the shoreline still persist. Follow up monitoring of the three points that were ear-marked for measurement changed; coastal area measurement from Ship Wreck is 150 meters away from the Sea, from Hippo creek is 110meters away from the Sea, while from Almond Tree is 95meters respectively.

In another development, in our Mangrove restoration programme, reafforestation of degraded part of the park was conducted and 210 mangrove propagues was planted along the eastern bloc of the eroded part. Though, the programme is on-going and the propagate seedlings were collected from the Mangrove bank at Sebikiri plant nursery.
