## Finima Nature Park Week 13 Report

## 1. Highlights:

 General anti-poaching patrol and biological monitoring was conducted round the park and observation was reported, (no arrest was made). Troops of Mona monkey, Green emerald snake, birds, crabs, Beetles, butterfly, skink, Dragonfly, Monitor lizards and footprint of Sitatunga were sighted in the park.

- **Outreach & Engagement:** Chrismilia International School, NLNG Water Well 5 visited the Resource centre for School Conservation activities with 45 pupils and 6 teachers respectively.

 Tidiness & Cleanliness: Tidiness of the Board walk and other park facilities arein progress, sweeping of board, clearing and cutting of fell tree branches along the walkway was also done. Also trail inspection was also carried out during the week; no damage was recorded, replacement of damaged deck boards and handrails is presently ongoing at first walkway.

**Coastal erosion & Encroachment**: monitoring of coastal erosion is ongoing, as observation shows that siltation and deposition of debris along the shoreline still persist. Follow up monitoring of the three points that are ear-marked for measurement changed; coastal area measurement from Ship Wreck is 150meters away from the Sea, from Hippo creek its 110meters away from the Sea, while from Almond Tree is 95meters respectively.
